Did you know that you live in an area every bit as historical and <u>valuable</u> as Twickenham or Old Town? Our development is the site of

- \* a sedimentary rock outcrop just west of the spring house that is imbedded with millions of fossilized prehistoric sea creatures
- \* an old Cherokee and Chickasaw campground, in the area around the spring
- \* possibly the only place in the world that rare, endangered sightless, albino crayfish accumulate
- \* Governor Reuben Chapman's home and farm
- \* the old Monte Sano Dairy (and the remains of its stone buildings—an outcropping at the spring house has the dairy operator's name etched on it, ca. 1889, but the building itself is believed to date from between 1820 to 1830))
- \* the home of Huntsville's most famous cow, Signal's Lily Flag
- \* the Chapman Dairy that served Huntsville's citizens through two world wars and the Great Depression

Our area was the subject of an entire issue (Spring 1989) of The Historic Huntsville Quarterly and is being researched for another article. This history and the physical remains of our rare stone buildings are worth preserving on their own merits.

But as a community of property owners it's to our advantage to work together to protect these treasures and enhance the value of our investment as homeowners in Gladstone Place.
